The Future of Language(s)

David Crystal

The end of the twentieth century was a revolutionary period for language and languages. The acknowledgement of the first truly global language, English, coincided with a realization of the crisis affecting the world's endangered and minority languages, and the arrival of a new technology, the Internet, offered an ambiguous role in relation to both these themes. For professionals working with language, things are never going to be the same again.

David Crystal is an academic, writer, editor and broadcaster. He is perhaps best known for his two encyclopedias for Cambridge University Press, The Cambridge Enclyopedia of Language and The Cambridge Encyclopedia of the English Language. Recent books include How Language Works, Words, Words, Words, The fight for English, and As they say in Zanzibar and By Hook or by Crook: a Journey in Search of English.

David is patron of the Association for Language Learning (ALL) and of the International Association of Teachers of English as a Foreign Language (IATEFL) and president of the UK National Literacy Association.

1.1 LINGUASIGN: an interactive, immersive approach, combining sign language with second language learning!

This session will give delegates

This session will look at the new TDA scheme of work for Mandarin Chinese (adapted from the QCA units) and show the exciting possibilities this language can offer. 1.3 Can you make gold out of straw? Trying to work miracles to conserve the endangered species of languages such as German in the KS3 curriculum.

The session will demonstrate how, in a reversal of established practice, we are using creative methods that have proved successful in language teaching at KS2, such as traditional tales and cross-curricular links, as the basis for a KS3 second FL curriculum

It will benefit teachers of German and other 'endangered' languages seeking to provide an inspirational experience that appears very different from lessons in the first foreign language and encourages autonomy in the limited time that learners have to fall in love with and remain faithful to this new language.

Helen Kent is the co-ordinator of the Primary Languages Project in a large language college in Cumbria, she has experience of teaching German, French and Russian in both secondary and primary schools and was Senior Lecturer in German at Plymouth University. In 2005 she initiated a project entitled Märchen und mehr! which was awarded a European Award for Languages.

1.4 Raising global awareness in a second language.

This workshop will show how it is possible to introduce a sense of global awareness and consideration for others as well as developing meaningful vocabulary and linguistic skills. The exercise in a French Immersion Kindergarten class in Canada began as a study of African animals, which led to the realization that they wanted to learn about African children, which resulted in the sponsorship of a barn full of animals and learning so much besides!

They continue to work with QCA on the development of training materials for the new AQA GCSE speaking exam for 2010-2011. This session will focus on the format of the new speaking exam and Jo Redford and Ana Neofitou will showcase practical teaching and learning strategies in French & Spanish which they have used to prepare their students

It is now over seven years since the National Languages Strategy was launched. Since then many millions of pounds have been invested in languages' education, much has been done and much has changed in particular the introduction of primary languages for all. And yet some of the underlying challenges of motivation and purpose remain. As we approach a new political era when – whoever is in power – funding will be significantly reduced, this is a moment to reflect on successes and failures and also to look forward to the next seven years. Has the strategy run its course? Do we need new aims, a new vision? Or have we done all that can be done? In this session Lid King, National Director for Languages throughout that period will give a personal view of the current situation, and give you the opportunity to make your own contribution to a view of the future. He will consider the policies that work and those that are less successful, not only in England but more widely as part of a Europewide discussion on languages – theory, policy and practice

The resource brings together computer gaming and language learning and is aimed at 11 to 16 year olds. It is funded by the DCSF and will be launched in March 2010.

The seminar will show delegates how the resource can help them and their pupils with French, Spanish, German or Mandarin. We will discuss how the resource was developed and give people the opportunity to ask questions. The session will also demonstrate some of MYLO's exciting functions and activities and will present feedback from teachers and pupils involved in the pilot phase.

Building on firm foundations – what is happening in primary languages?

Cynthia Martin, Carrie Cable, Patricia Driscoll and Ros Mitchell

What are we building on? A snapshot from the latest UK research on languages learning at KS2/a snapshot of languages learning from the latest UK research

Do you teach languages in primary or secondary schools? Are you a student teacher or initial teacher trainer? Do you deliver CPD or run a support group for primary languages teachers? Are you passionate about language learning?

This plenary will provide an overview of key findings from the DCSF longitudinal study 'Languages Learning at KS2' of relevance to everyone interested in early language learning and the foundation being laid in the primary phase. Come along and discover what is happening in primary schools and consider challenges and implications for learning and teaching across sectors.

Cynthia Martin, President ALL, Carrie Cable Senior Lecturer in Education at the Open University, Patricia Driscoll manages the PGCE in Primary Languages at CCCU and Ros Mitchell currently teaches applied linguistics at the University of Southampton.

5.1 KS2 into KS3: continuity and progression through CLIL *Eva Lamb and Elisabeth Coyne*

Just over half of the Year 7 pupils at King Edward VII School have followed a structured and carefully planned programme of Spanish over four years in their primary schools, the others come from over 30 other primary schools and have very mixed (if any) prior experience of Spanish. The CLIL approach was one of the strategies the Spanish Department used to meet the needs of these mixed-experience classes. It helped teachers to move from teaching explicitly from the front to allowing the children to use their knowledge of Spanish in new contexts, to share it with their peers and to learn from each other.

Eva Lamb is Language College Director at King Edward VII School Elisabeth Coyne is Primary Languages Development Coordinator and teaches in all five partner primary schools of the KES family of schools.

5.2 Cross-curricular initiatives in cross-phase partnerships *Wendy Cobb*

In 2008 Medway LA launched their cross-phase languages network pilot. During this session the network co-ordinator will outline how joint training for KS2/3 teachers supports partnership working. She will also highlight how the focus on integrating language learning and ICT addressed issues in both the primary and secondary curriculum. Ideas from their 2009/10 collaborative cross–curricular community themed project will also be shared.

Wendy Cobb is an Advisory Teacher for MFL in Medway where she coordinates KS2/3 cross-phase languages networks with a focus on integrated language learning. Wendy is also a Senior Lecturer with CCCU and trains language specialists teaching in London primary schools on the Teach First Primary Pilot.

5.3 'I'm a subject specialist – get me out of here!' Anna Lise Gordon

This session shares a cross -curricular initiative between ITE subject tutors and their trainee teachers, leading to an interactive school-based event with year 7 in a partnership school. The focus is on modelling effective practice and could be adapted by teachers working together across a range of curriculum areas and sectors.

8.1 Unlocking potential! Aligning the KS2 and KS3 frameworks

This presentation seeks to show how KS2 and KS3 teachers working together developing cross-phase /cross-curricular teaching materials based on the Puy du Fou theme park, incorporating KAL/LLS with a focus on PLTS led to greatly improved understanding of pedagogical approaches. This is having an impact on the pupils' learning in both Key Stages. Working across the traditional subject boundaries has led to increased enjoyment and motivation, for example, the use of drama techniques and creative approaches in delivering French through art and music. Pupils applied transferable skills, e.g. mathematical concepts and history/geography research enquiry strategies.

Juliet is an expert in the NVQ pathway and is currently working with schools across the country to introduce the qualification in order to raise motivation, uptake and attainment.
