1	Embedding Literacy through MFL	How have I embraced the Literacy Strategy across the curriculum and made it work to promote the teaching of MFL whilst supporting literacy development through the Academy?

The rationale will be described, examples given in French and Spanish and then it will be demonstrated how an argument can be built why language teaching is essential in secondary schools in 2012
2	Austria: Country, Culture and Creativity	The aims of this project were two-fold: to strengthen and promote the teaching of German and to aid transition between Key Stages 3 and 4. A series of lesson plans were developed which promote active learning and student autonomy and promote the development of Intercultural Understanding using

The new GCSE and the advent of controlled coursework in both speaking and writing means a well considered approach is required if teaching and learning are to be fun and engaging. This session showcases some activities which can be used to develop skills in both speaking and writing, ensuring learning does not become dull and constrained to the mechanics of the syllabus.
6	Reinventing Year 7 Kay Ray Brigitte Bourdériat The East Riding of Yorkshire	This project developed resources to ensure progression from a rapidly establishing primary language programme. The aims were to improve transition (the primary AST for languages was part of the team) and increase motivation and engagement amongst year 7 pupils. It was important in a changing climate to avoid simply starting from the beginning by taking into account those pupils with prior knowledge while allowing those with less or no prior knowledge to have a firm foundation in language learning.
