The Government has removed the list of prescribed languages for Key Stage 2, enabling schools to make their own decisions. The DFE has also published updated drafts of the Programmes of Study for Key Stages 2 and 3 in their latest <u>national curriculum</u> <u>framework document</u>. The final version of the framework is due to be published this Autumn.

Our 'Focus on...' section looks at whether the new Key Stage 2 Programme of Study can be taught through cross-curricular learning. The News section includes our plan to make primary CLIL resources available and the Events list has three exciting primary FLAME events taking place next term.

Cross-curricular resources for Key Stage 2

FLAME is planning to develop units of learning for Key Stage 2 which combine language learning with another area of the curriculum. The 6 week units will focus on creative and engaging activities that have already worked successfully in the classroom. Learning objectives will be focused on progress in both the subject and language and will be designed to meet the requirements of the Programmes of Study. Resources will include a scheme of work, lesson plans and a range of learning materials and assessment activities. Two units will be developed initially, combining French with two different subjects.

Could the UK develop a craze for bilingual learning? The author of a Times article who has visited Bohunt School thinks that it might.

A recent Times article features the CLIL initiative at Bohunt School in Hampshire, where each immersion class (one group per year) learns one third of the curriculum through French or Spanish. Chinese is being introduced in addition for the new Year 7 cohort next term, each year's immersion class learning one of the three languages. The immersion programme runs for five consecutive years and pupils take GCSE languages in Year 9 and A level languages in Year 11. A wide range of subjects are involved, with different subjects chosen for each language according to teachers' subject and language skills. As has been shown in other UK schools, the 'immersion' pupils achieve better results in all subjects whether or not they have learned it through the target language.

The article also refers to an 'explosion of interest' for immersion learning in the United States, based on research evidence that the pupils achieve higher levels of cognition. So far the trend has led to a thousand US schools introducing bilingual education, in most cases teaching 50% of the curriculum through the target language. Could we be next?

A focus on...

A perfect fit? Using CLIL to teach the new national curriculum

The introduction to the recently published <u>national curriculum framework</u> states: "The national curriculum provides an outline of core knowledge around which teachers can develop exciting and stimulating lessons to promote the development of pupils' knowledge, understanding and skills as part of the wider school curriculum." But this freedom does not prevent teachers from also developing exciting and stimulating lessons in the compulsory curriculum.

The updated Key Stage 2 Programme of Study for languages remains short and to the point, and lists 12 things that 'pupils should be taught'. Almost all are CLIL-friendly, including:

- Listen attentively to spoken language and show understanding by joining in and responding
- Engage in conversations; ask and answer questions; express opinions and respond to those of others; seek clarification and help
- Present ideas and information orally to a range of audiences
- Write phrases from memory, and adapt these to create new sentences, to express ideas clearly
- Describe people, places, things and actions orally and in writing

Just one bullet point relates to grammar, which could be taught separately using structures relevant to the cross-curricular lessons, or integrated with them. Two other requirements that might not always feature in a CLIL lesson are:

- Explore the patterns and sounds of language through songs and rhymes and link the spelling, sound and meaning of words, and
- Appreciate stories, songs, poems and rhymes in the language (my emphasis)

But who could resist scientific stories, SEAL songs, PE poems and RE rhymes?

FLAME events for Autumn 2013

Primary CLIL in all year groups: transforming achievement in languages Italian Day at Springfield Lower School, Kempston, Bedford, Friday 25th October 2013

This is an open day with a difference! The whole school will take part in the Italian Day, creating a great opportunity to see how the school has brought CLIL into the curriculum for all year groups from Reception to Key Stage 2. There will be a variety of activities and teaching styles, with much delivered in the target language. Learning strategies will include songs, transferring vocabulary, scaffolding learning, stories, questioning and problem solving. Deputy Head Marianne Allen says: "All classes will have a variety of independent tasks for the children to access as well as whole class teaching related to the Key Stage topics. This showcase is to demonstrate that delivery in the target language is not beyond class teachers. Like all schools, we are on a journey. It is not perfect but we hope the enthusiasm of the children and teachers will inspire more schools to reflect on the importance of teaching other curriculum areas in the target language."

Springfield won the Primary Languages Classroom Award for Italian in 2012, and their headteacher has commented "Our teaching style has a profound effect on the children's experiences and the rate that they acquire a new language. It has been an amazing learning journey for the staff and the children, with Italian now being spoken around the school both in, and outside, lesson time."
