Joining up language learning

2014 is a very important year for language learning – from September 2014, the teaching of languages will be compulsory for all 7 – 14 year olds in England. This will be a challenge for colleagues in primary schools, many of whom will be teaching languages for the first time, and for those in secondary schools, who will need to assess what progress these students have made, and build on these foundations. So where do language teachers across the country find the support and advice they need to rise to these new challenges?

The Association for Language Learning (ALL) is the UK's major subject association for teachers of all languages, at all levels, and in all sectors. ALL's annual conference, *Language World*, is the key national event for language teachers, bringing them together to share ideas, offer mutual support and plan for the future for languages education. This year our theme is 'Joined Up': exploring ways we can work together to meet the most important challenges we face as a subject community.

"Language World has been for me, for more than ten years now, the one training event I never miss," says Rachel Hawkes, ALL's President. "It is an annual immersion in reflection and creativity, the re-awakening of enthusiasm through fresh ideas, the constructive debate about pedagogy, policy and practice, and the joyful encounter with likeminded colleagues... There will be something for everyone."

The packed programme of workshops, major talks and plenaries, with updates, ideas and inspiration from a host of speakers from all over languages education, will include:

On Friday 04 April:

- At **11:55**, the **Mary Glasgow Plenary Lecture**: Judith Woodfield on *Content and Language Intergrated Learning (CLIL): The best BOGOF deal for whole school improvement and transition.*
- At **16:00**, our regular **Panel Debate**, chaired this year by actor and languages champion Larry Lamb. We'll be asking guests from the worlds of education, business, politics and the media about the challenges ahead for languages.

• At **17:00**, the **UK launch** of the <u>Language Perfect World Championships 2014</u>, a global languages competition

run in association with New Zealand based firm Language Perfect.

At 19:30, the launch of the 2013 Language Trends Survey. This annual survey of primary and secondary

schools is conducted by the Languages Education Team (formerly CILT, now part of the CfBT Education Trust),

in partnership with the Association for Language Learning and the Independent Schools' Modern Languages

Association. It explores aspects of the teaching and learning of languages in primary and secondary education

in England and has become a barometer for the health of languages in English schools.

professionals and phases.

Language World is one of the biggest annual events for teachers of languages and brings together all that's best in

the world of language teaching: top thinkers speaking on topics close to their hearts, leading practitioners sharing

their latest resources, policy makers explaining the thinking behind recent developments and passionate teachers

ready to share ideas and exchange views. In the lead up to the introduction of the new national curriculum in

September 2014, it encourages delegates to work together across sectors to support and promote language teaching

and learning in the UK.
