25 years of being ALL Connected

The Association for Language Learning (ALL) is the UK's major subject association for teachers of all languages, at all levels, and in all sectors. ALL's annual conference, ***Language World***, is the key national event for language teachers, which brings them together to share ideas, offer mutual support and plan for the future for languages education – and 2015 is our 25th anniversary!

The Association for Language Learning (ALL) was founded in 1990; and the first Language World conference took place at the University of Exeter in March 1990. ALL is now the major subject association for those involved in teaching languages at all levels, and one of the only organisations left to support and represent language teachers.

Language World 2015 will be at Newcastle University, 20-21 March 2015, and its theme is 'ALL Connected': emphasising the importance of joining together across educational sectors to achieve the best in language learning. For teachers of languages, being connected to colleagues across sectors, local areas and language groups has never been more important – as the national community for language teachers, ALL is at the centre of that professional network, and has been for 25 years. "The language community and the various sectors need to work together, in order to be joined up", says René Koglbauer, ALL President. "Over the years, ALL has been able to influence policy; the stronger and more connected we are, the greater voice we have got!"

The packed programme of workshops, major talks and plenaries, with updates, ideas and inspiration from a host of speakers from all over languages education, will include:

Language World is one of the biggest annual events for teachers of languages and brings together all that's best in the world of language teaching: top thinkers speaking on topics close to their hearts, leading practitioners sharing their latest resources, policy makers explaining the thinking behind recent developments and passionate teachers ready to share ideas and exchange views. It encourages delegates to work together across sectors to support and promote language teaching and learning in the UK.

This will be the thirteenth edition of the report and for the first time, this year's England survey will be followed by analysis of language learning in schools in Wales later in the year.
